

## PAFP Applauds Introduction of Bills to Advance Patient-Centered Care Model

(HARRISBURG, PA.) In a move aimed at reforming Pennsylvania's Medicaid program to adopt Patient-Centered Medical Home models of care, state Sen. Judy Schwank (D-Berks) and state Rep. Matt Baker (R-Tioga) have filed Senate Bill 1083 and House Bill 1655, respectively. Developed with the Pennsylvania Academy of Family Physicians (PAFP), the bills would establish the "Patient-Centered Medical Home (PCMH) Advisory Council" to provide policy recommendations to the state Dept. of Public Welfare.

The council, comprising representatives of health provider groups including family physicians, OB/GYNs, pharmacists, nurse practitioners, hospitals and others such as appointed state officials, would draw upon the experiences of other public and private payers to advance a physician-led PCMH model – a care delivery model centered around an ongoing partnership between a patient and physician who coordinates personalized care with a team. Through the council's actions, Pennsylvania would work toward joining the 26 other state Medicaid programs that have launched PCMH initiatives on a state or regional basis.

Earlier in 2013, Gov. Tom Corbett's administration was awarded a Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) State Innovation Models planning grant to explore transforming Pennsylvania's Medicaid program. While the plan has not been finalized, the PCMH care model has been identified as a main component to be included in Pennsylvania's future application to CMS for implementation funding.

PCMH models have also gained momentum with private insurers in Pennsylvania, including <u>Highmark</u>, who announced on Jan. 23, 2013 <u>it will be expanding its initiative</u> to include more than 1,000 primary care doctors. Highmark's pilot data reflected a 2 percent reduction in cost, as well as fewer inpatient admissions and readmissions to hospitals.
